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SUMMARY

Polliwog doesn't want her life to change, but her transformation forces her to enter an unknown world outside the pond where she embraces her new life as a frog.

THEMES

The dominant theme is **FEAR** of change. Polliwog is afraid to leave her home. She is afraid to breathe air. She is afraid she will never see Perch again. But Polliwog is **BRAVE**. She leaves the water and accepts her new life outside the pond. She learns that her fear was unnecessary. Polliwog does see Perch again. Now she will try to **TEACH** other tadpoles that they have nothing to fear!

CHARACTERS

The **HERO** is the main character. (Polliwog)

The **TEACHER** character is a mentor to the hero. The Teacher is a wise and positive figure who aids or trains the hero on their journey. Not every story will have a Teacher (for example, *The Ugly Duckling*). The difference between a Teacher and Helper is the Teacher contributes more to the Hero's understanding of their journey or goal. (Perch)

HELPER characters assist the hero on their journey or 'help' the hero achieve their goal. (Frogs)

TROUBLEMAKERS are opposed to the hero's goal, or they are an obstacle for the Hero to overcome. In this story Polliwog thinks the frogs are troublemakers, but they are trying to play with her and help her. They know she is a frog, too! The frogs are not troublemakers. They are helpers. This is a good example of POINT-OF-VIEW.

PLOT

Polliwog is written as a **Circle Story** to reflect the life cycle of a frog. In the end the story begins anew with a tadpole looking quizzically at a "pesky frog" (Polliwog grown up).

BEGINNING (ACT I)		
Big PROBLEM	Bigger PROBLEM	Biggest PROBLEM
Perch says Polliwog will leave the pond one day.	Polliwog is changing. She grows tiny legs.	Polliwog can no longer breathe with gills.

In the beginning of the story, Polliwog is afraid to leave her mentor/friend, Perch (the Teacher character).

MIDDLE (ACT II)		
SOLUTION	NEW PROBLEM	SOLUTION
Polliwog leaves pond.	Polliwog is alone outside the pond.	Polliwog makes new friends- the frogs!

Polliwog finds new friends (Helper characters, Frogs).

END (ACT III)		
NEW LIFE	CLIMAX	END
Frogs teach Polliwog to eat, play, & swim.	Polliwog goes back into pond and sees Perch!	Polliwog wants to play with tadpoles.

Now that Polliwog is grown up, she understands and appreciates Perch's wisdom. Now Polliwog will be a Helper character to the next generation of tadpoles. The story repeats with new tadpole(s) as Perch's friend(s)...
